Program Analysis

Internal Strengths

1. What strengths does the analysis of student data reveal?

Strong student interest in political science (161 Political Science Program Students), and especially among Hispanic students (93 Hispanic Political Science students 57.76%). Source: Colleague Student Demographic, 2017-18

High success rates for certain races/ethnicities. 83% for Asian and Filipino/a students, 79% for Pacific Islander students, 77% for White students in 2016/2017.

2. Are there specific aspects of the program that are exemplary or could serve as a model?

The Political Internship Program (POLSC 195 and POLSC 196), and the community partnerships this program establishes. We place about 5 to 8 students in political internships each semester.

3. What do others see as the program's strengths?

Extra-curricular activities. The program sponsors two campus clubs: The Freedom Forum and The Human Rights Club.

4. How well are students meeting program learning outcomes, skills, or competencies; and how are they relevant to careers in your discipline or industries for which you help prepare students?

Our good student success rates help enable students to develop strong critical thinking, research, and oral and written communication skills. These skills and competencies are emphasized in our program learning outcomes. And these skills and competencies are relevant to careers in the discipline, such as research analysts, community organizers, teachers, lawyers, and politicians.

Internal Weaknesses

5. What gaps are observed by reviewing the student data?

Success rates for Hispanic (65%) and African American students (68%) are lower than success rates for Asian (83%), Filipino/a (83%), Pacific Islander (79%) and White students (77%), in 2016/2017. While 11 students attained Political Science Program awards in 2017-18, the students were all Hispanic or White, non-Hispanic. Students of other ethnicities did not receive an award in 2017-18.

7. What are areas in which the program could improve? (curriculum, scheduling, modality, other?)

We need to offer more classes on the West Campus.

We need to offer more face-to face classes. This requires hiring more adjunct faculty who are available to teach on campus during the mornings or afternoons.

8. Where are there gaps in the program on how students are meeting learning outcomes, skills, or competencies?

Because the success rates for Hispanic and African American students are lower, they are not meeting the program learning outcomes as well as Asian, Filipino/a, and White students.

10. What are some industry or disciplinary trends that could enhance the program?

11. How are changing resources, technology, employer, or transfer requirements affecting the program's ability to serve students?

Certain political internship partners require students to complete a criminal background check to do the internship. The partners sometimes require students to pay for it (\$50).

12. What are some current industry or disciplinary trends that could have a negative impact on the program?

If there is an economic recession, it will obviously have a negative impact on job prospects for our political science students.

13. What other obstacles does the program face?

No universities in the region offer a M.A. in Political Science (CSU Stanislaus and the University of Pacific offer a M.A. in Public Administration but that is not the same as Political Science. UC Merced offers a Ph.D. in Political Science but not a M.A.). This makes it more difficult to find a large pool of qualified adjunct faculty.
